## RESOURCE MINISTRY

The month of February saw Zion Lutheran once again run a monthly surplus!

In February, 2019, revenues totaled \$14,211.78. Expenses for the month totaled \$12,669.13. The monthly surplus of \$1,542.65 increased the Year-To-Date surplus to \$1,774.14. The reason for the surplus is noteworthy: although revenue for the month of February was down slightly from the same month in 2018, expenses were down nearly 40% from February, 2018. A clear indication that the infrastructure improvements and energy saving measures implemented have resulted in eliminating what were at one time recurring costly maintenance expenses.

Good stewardship concerning our resources, coupled with what continues to be a solid, carefully allocated investment portfolio, facilitates our efforts to confidently, albeit judiciously, pursue philanthropic and humanitarian efforts in a meaningful way while simultaneously reaching out to the community and fulfilling our obligations to participate in international Lutheran relief efforts.

## THE CALL PROCESS

We are pleased to report that factors previously noted as inhibiting the Call Process have been alleviated. As weather conditions improve somewhat (although not everywhere), Congregations seeking to Call a Pastor and individuals seeking a Call have greater flexibility in making interview and travel arrangements. Congregations and Pastors who have been preoccupied with preparations for the Lenten Season and Easter Services are now able to focus more intently on the Call Process. Zion's strong Ministry Site Profile and close working relationship with the Northeast Ohio Synod has facilitated identification of viable prospects.

Zion is once again immersed in the process of interviewing promising candidates. We are well prepared, both technologically and on a personal level, to converse with prospective Call Pastors to determine if the individual is in a position to effectively partner with Zion and if the individual is seriously interested in doing so.

Although we appreciate the need to continue to proceed cautiously and judiciously, recent developments leave us somewhat confident that we are going to succeed in identifying that individual best suited intellectually, temperamentally and spiritually to serve as Zion's Called Pastor.

## OUR GOOD FRIDAY LITURGICAL PAINTING

(Designs and Explanations by Carol Rossbach)

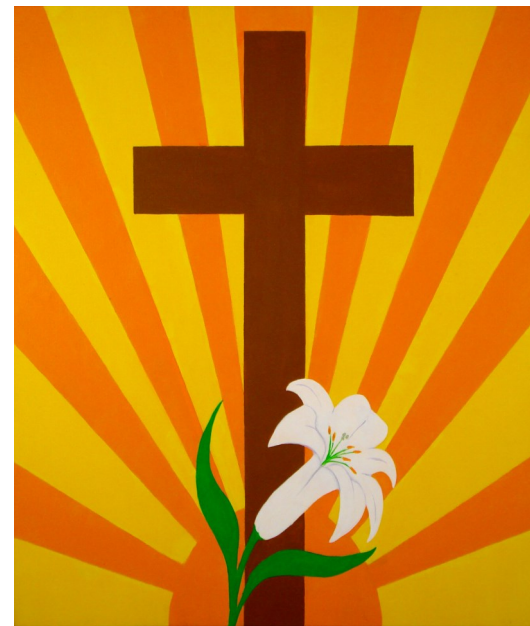
**GOOD FRIDAY – CROSS WITH THORNS:** The cross is, without questions, the most well-known symbol of Christianity. It is at the heart of Lent and Holy Week as we fix our focus on the central event in the history of salvation, the death of Christ on the cross. The cross is combined with a crown of thorns as classic symbols of Jesus' suffering. We cannot be certain which of the various species of briars, thistles or thorny plants were selected for the mock crown placed on Jesus' head. But apart from their use as a fuel or as protective hedges, like thistles of today they were nasty weeds. The crown of thorns worn by Jesus as he walked the *Via Dolorosa*, the way of suffering leading to death, stands in stark contrast to the green laurel crowns that were used in athletic games, the crown of roses worn by emperors, and crowns adorned with precious metals worn by both royalty and wealthy citizens. Jesus chose instead to be numbered among transgressors as he gave his life for ours on the cross.



## EASTER LITURGICAL PAINTING

(Designs and Explanations by Carol Rossbach)

**EASTER SYMBOL – CROSS & LILIES:** When his opponents in Corinth stressed a theology of power and glory, Paul spoke these powerful words: "The word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.... Jews demand signs and Greeks seek wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified, a scandal to Jews and foolishness to Greeks, but to those who are called, Christ crucified is the power of God and the wisdom of God." (1<sup>st</sup> Cor. 1:18, 22-24). The centrality of the cross is reflected in this symbol, where the cross stands empty, reflecting the victory of the resurrection. The rays of the rising sun in the background signal that it was on the morning of the third day that Christ arose. Our painting includes lilies, biblical reminders of Jesus' teachings, along with his suffering and his victory over the grave. Often called the *white-robed apostles of hope*, lilies were said to be found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane after Christ's agony. Tradition has it that beautiful white lilies sprung up where drops of Christ's sweat fell to the ground in his final hours of sorrow and deep distress. Churches continue to honor this tradition at Easter by banking their altars and surrounding their crosses with Easter lilies, to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ and our hope for life everlasting.





We who have a church family to love us and support us are lucky people. Prayers like Gordon’s don’t have to be hard or awkward. The Lord knows what we are trying to say before we even start. The purpose of the exercise is to be open to the conversation and to listen for the answer.

Gordon’s Rules to live by. This was at the bottom of his prayer. Clearly something different but related.

Rules to Live By

- Do something for someone else.
- Do something for yourself.
- Do something you don’t want to do that needs doing.

- “A place for everything and everything in its place!” (Added by Mark)
- Do a physical exercise.
- Do a mental exercise.
- Do an original prayer that always includes counting your blessings.

MAUNDY THURSDAY LITURGICAL PAINTING  
(Designs and Explanations by Carol Rossbach)

MAUNDY THURSDAY — HOLY COMMUNION

This painting represents the Lord’s Last Supper. As we are told in Mark 14:22-24, “While they were eating, he took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it he broke it, gave it to them and said, ‘Take; this is my body.’ Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, and all of them drank from it. He said to them, ‘This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many. Truly, I tell you, I will never again drink of the fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God.’” Notice the essential elements: the bread, the cup, stalks of wheat, the fruit of the vine. The stalks of wheat and the bunch of grapes remind us that while we stand alone as individuals in larger groups and massive fields, through the cup that we share, we are the one loaf, that is, one body in Christ. This unity is a miracle that is God’s doing. As the body of Christ, we are the gift of God’s new creation.

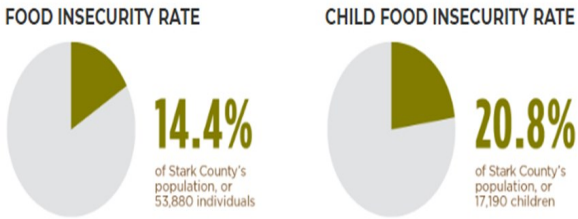
foods offers both physical and mental strength and belief in self-worth and value.

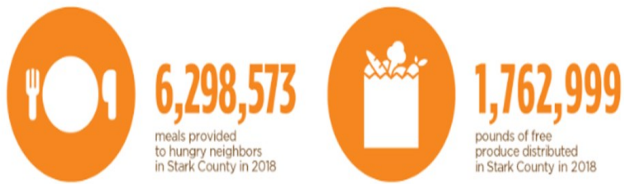
## HUNGER IN STARK COUNTY

Food insecurity refers to the USDA's measure of lack of regular access to nutritional food for an active and healthy life. The food insecurity rate in Stark County is 14.4 percent of the total population, and the child food insecurity rate is 20.8 percent.

In 2017, your Foodbank distributed 8,288,798 pounds of food and essential items to Stark County families in need. Of that, 1,923,978 pounds was produce, which was distributed for free.

## CONGRATULATIONS RON!!



Ron Tvorik was elected the 2018 Flotilla Commander of the Year for Eastern Region 9th District of the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary at the recent Coast Guard Auxiliary D-Train Conference held in Dunkirk, NY. Ron's family, wife, Linda, and grandchildren, Chrissy Nicholson and L.J. Brown, were present to watch him accept the award.

This award was given to Ron for demonstrating outstanding and dynamic leadership while serving as Flotilla Commander of Flotilla 6-1, Akron, OH. Ron voluntarily dedicated nearly 8-man weeks of his time throughout 2018 to facilitate the FSO Bridge and his members to achieve a most successful year. Exhibiting inspirational leadership, effective communication and tactical patience, Ron moved the Akron team to grow in expanded diversity of membership, member qualifications and expanded operational support to active duty USCG missions. Flotilla 6-1 is, without doubt, the largest and most active Flotilla in Division 6 and under the outstanding leadership of Ron as Flotilla Commander. Under his tenure and extensive HR contributions, he grew the flotilla from 37 to 44 members, as well as advancing numerous new member qualifications up

to BQ and even AUXOP. His flotilla membership achieved a total of 6517 volunteer hours in 2018, of which 310 hours involved Marine Patrols and 4,854 in Recreational Boating Safety efforts. The Member Training and Operations performance of Ron's Flotilla is exceptionally strong and sets the bar of their neighboring Flotillas. In March, they extended an invitation to conduct a two-day Surface Operations training at Station Cleveland Harbor to all Division 6 and Division 7 Surface Operations participants and trainees.

During Ron's time with the USCGAux in 2018, he and his staff logged 72 Public Education hours, 184 Public Affairs hours and conducted 154 hours of member training promoting water safety to the membership and the public.

Flotilla 6-1 Akron dedicated 535 hours supporting Public Affairs and community relations from Kent River Days to Portage Lakes Paddle Palooza to the Cleveland Air Show and recently launched a new Flotilla 6-1 Facebook page for community outreach, promotion of recreational boating safety, recruiting and celebration of diversity efforts.
