

CARING MINISTRY



Please pray the following prayer: Heavenly Father, help our food pantry volunteers and clients stay safe during the coronavirus food distributions and enable us to continue providing this ministry through this critical time Amen.

Zion Food Pantry client numbers have dropped by 82 people in March. This drop is from our December 2019 high. Please keep supporting your food pantry and all our clients. During March we served 127 people from 77 households. The March client breakdown was as follows: 15 children {0-17}, 49 adults (18-59), and 63 seniors (age 60+). The major drop was in the adult category, which could have been caused by confusion surrounding the coronavirus epidemic.

Thank You to the people who volunteered to drive members to doctor appointments and church.

The dates for the May Food Pantry and Clothing Closet are the 5th and the 19th. Set up time is at 9:00 am with the doors opening at 1:00 pm.



FOOD PANTRY needs cereal, spaghetti sauce, crunchy peanut butter, jelly (any flavor except grape), canned fruit (especially canned pineapple), canned vegetables, hot cereal such as individually packaged flavored instant oatmeal, and creamed soups of all kinds (no to-

mato soup).

CLOTHING CLOSET is in need of household items such as; bath towels, hand towels, tea towels, dishes, pots, pans, etc. We need all sizes of infant, toddlers, pre-teen, and teen girls and



boy's clothes and jackets. We are also in need of men's big and tall shirts, sweatshirts, pants, sweatpants, and jeans.

RESOURCE MINISTRY

God's peace and love be with you, today and always. In these trying times, we continue to pray religiously and act responsibly to help Zion address and weather this health crisis.

Our financial results improved significantly in March. Our monthly giving rate increased 19.3% compared to 2019, and our YTD giving rate has improved to 16.9% vs 2019. This is a substantial improvement over our January-February results and more consistent with our results from Fall 2019. Considering this rate of giving and our budget expenses, our March results produced a budget deficit of \$1,385.78. Our YTD budget deficit of \$19,602.95 is offset by 2019 surplus of \$7,646.18 to produce 2020 YTD Net Income of \$11,956.77 (deficit). This result is not unexpected based on our 2020 budget projections but we had anticipated an improvement based on 2019 year end results.

We realize this is a troubling time and that significant impacts to your personal finances may be occurring. We want to assure you that Zion will continue to function in a virtual manner and we will continue to support necessary ministry functions. We need your financial support to accomplish these objectives and count our blessings that you are able assist to the extent that you can manage.

Since our face-to-face contacts will be limited for the foreseeable future, you can continue your giving support for Zion through the mail, drop it off at church or you may utilize our new electronic giving options. A significant number of Zion members are now utilizing this option of giving and the systems have been working very well.

If you are not currently using this option, you may get started using the following links based on your desired electronic connection. There is also a link on the Zion-NC.com website for On-Line giving.

You may choose to have recurring payment at intervals of weekly, monthly, or annually. This recurring payment would be most beneficial for Zion planning.

Finance Committee encourages us to use ACH (checking account) as a payment method since ACH fees are 0.8% + \$0.35 per transaction whereas most credit cards are 2.35% + \$0.35 per transaction but American Express is 3.50% + \$0.35 per transaction. You can help Zion offset some of those costs by checking the check box.

We know that we can get through this crisis by trusting to God's blessings and exercising appropriate personal responsibility. The pandemic has forced us to improve Zion's infrastructure and enhance our capability for virtual worship when "face-to-face" contact is restricted. We will continue to refine and improve our capabilities; they will continue to be utilized, even when we are able to return to worship.

Please stay connected and supportive! We have enjoyed our weekly calls with you, and pray for God's blessings and support as we experience the coming days. God's peace and blessings for you all!

Book Discussion News Linda Weidenbach

Our seasonal book discussion (always open to *all*) will kick off on Friday October 2, 2020. In light of being in the midst of a presidential campaign, we will be discussing the book *Truman*, by David McCullough. (Last season we read a book about the settling of Ohio by McCullough; the book was called *The Pioneers*.)

Here are some facts about President Harry Truman:

- He was born in Lamar, Missouri, in 1884; John Truman, Harry's father, was a farmer and livestock dealer.
- When Truman was six, his parents moved to Independence, Missouri, so he could attend the Presbyterian Church Sunday School. He did not attend a traditional school until he was eight. While living in Independence, he served as a *Shabbos goy* for Jewish neighbors, doing tasks for them on Shabbat that their religion prevented them from doing on that day.
- He rose at five every morning to practice the piano, which he studied more than twice a week until he was fifteen, becoming quite a skilled player.
- During World War I, he was sent to France as a captain in the Field Artillery.
- Truman served as the 33rd president of the United States from 1945 to 1953, succeeding upon the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt after serving as vice president.

Church post Coronavirus shut down

When will things get back to normal? Probably a better question might be what will the new normal look like? When Governor DeWine was asked about Ohio re-opening for business he stated; "It's going to be different." He went on to say "Until there is a vaccine, this monster is going to be lurking around us. It's not going away...people are going to have to be exceedingly careful."

That applies to when church re-opens too. We are all longing for the time when we can be together to worship and partake in Holy Communion. All of us are also concerned for each other's well-being. Hopefully, we will re-open soon. In preparation, your church council put together a plan with precautionary measures that will keep everyone safe.

Our primary objective is to protect the physical, emotional and spiritual health of everyone.

What can we do to protect each other? Here are our recommendations:

> One service at 9:00

With many of our siblings in Christ being in the high risk category, attendance will be low for a while as some choose to remain safe by continuing to worship via our recorded services. It is also impractical to sanitize the building between two services. 9:00 is a time that allows for no particular group to be largely inconvenienced; everyone can adapt a little bit.

No Sunday School

The Sunday School season typically closes at the end of May, so even if we re-open in May it is prudent to limit exposure that could happen in a classroom setting.

➤ Limited building access

Every area we access or surface we touch must be sanitized. This a large building and it is impractical to sanitize the whole space each week. Therefore, access will be limited as follows:

- Entrances two entrances will be open to the building;
 - Front Entrance (Lindy Lane near the Office Area)
 - Rear Entrance (Portage, into Luther Hall).

All other entrances will be locked.

- o Hand sanitizing solution is at each entrance, please help eliminate cross contamination by using the hand sanitizing solution as you enter <u>and</u> leave.
- o Education Wing, Gymnasium, and Kitchen will be blocked off since they will not be used.

Child Care

The child care room will be closed. The entire room and all toys have been sanitized for when this service is allowed to be used. Sanitizing on a weekly basis is impractical.

> Seating in the worship space adjusted

- o Sit in pews without cushions bare wood is easier to sanitize than cloth
- Every other pew will be open for seating this will help maintain proper distancing

Giving of Tithes and Offerings

Place in the collection plate at the entrance to the worship space. Please do not seal your envelopes by licking.

> Hymnals and Registration Folder

It is impractical to sanitize the hymnals and registration folders so they are removed.

- o All hymns will be printed in the worship folder.
- o Ushers will be charged with recording those who are present.
- o Prayer cards and envelopes are still available; please use your own pen

Worship Folders

To prevent cross contamination, ushers will not distribute folders. Folders will be available for you to pick up on a stand as you enter the worship space.

Please take folders home with you. Alternately, there is a recycling box outside the worship space into which you may place your used folder. Please do not leave folders in the pews or lay them on tables.

> Sharing of the Peace of Christ

This practice will be suspended for now.

> Holy Communion

We will continue with individual cups. The trays will have fewer cups. You are asked to carefully remove your own cup, placing the empty cup in the tray held by the acolyte. Pastor and Communion Assistants will continue to sanitize their hands prior to distributing communion.

> Post service reception with Pastor

Shaking of hands will be suspended. Pastor will stand outside the worship space so as to maintain six-foot distancing as you leave. Please do not congregate in the area immediately outside the worship space (Narthex). You are encouraged to move directly to Luther Hall where there is plenty of room for six-foot distancing.

We will do everything we can to make our time together safe for everyone. This is a work in progress and this plan will be revised and adapted as appropriate. Please contact any member of Council or Pastor with your questions, concerns or comments. We welcome your input.

The lament is often heard; "All churches are declining." But that statement is not correct; there are churches that are thriving and vibrant. Is there room for more churches to bloom and grow? Absolutely!




