

Resumption of In-person Worship Services

We will resume live in-person worship services on Sunday June 7, 2020. See a separate article about Wednesday Evening Casual Outdoor Services. Before we identify what to expect, there are two important points to emphasize:

First – Our primary objective is to protect the physical, emotional and spiritual health of everyone.

Second – It is perfectly acceptable to stay home and continue participating through our continuing recorded services for those who are most at risk, those uncomfortable venturing outside their homes, those who have been exposed to the virus, and those not feeling well.

Your Congregational Council and Worship Ministry Team put together the following precautionary measures:

- ➤ One Sunday worship service at 9:00 am
 Sanitizing, music accompanist, and practicality issues deem it necessary to do only one service on Sunday. 9:00 is a time that allows for no particular group to be largely inconvenienced; everyone can adapt a little bit, can't we?
- > Two open entrance doors Front (Lindy Lane) and Rear (Portage). All other doors will be locked.
- ➤ Limited access to inside areas All Offices, Education Wing, Gymnasium, and Kitchen will be blocked off since they will not be used. Deacons will utilize the Resource Room for counting.
- ➤ Hand sanitizing stations Each entrance will have a sanitizing station, please show your love for others by using the sanitizing solution as you enter and leave.
- ➤ Masks Everyone is asked to bring and wear a mask while in the building. Clean masks available, if needed.
- ➤ Child Care The child care room will be closed and unavailable for use.
- > Seating space adjusted To allow for proper distancing, every other pew will be open for seating.
- Giving of Tithes and Offerings A collection plate will be on a stand at the entrance to the worship space.
 - Please do not seal your envelopes by licking.
- > Hymnals and Registration Folder removed All hymns will be printed in the worship folder.
- **Worship Bulletins** These will be placed in the pews.
- ➤ Sharing of the Peace of Christ This practice will be suspended for now.
- ➤ Holy Communion a new method will be used for distribution of communion to accommodate physical distancing guidelines and safe handling practices.
- > Singing Recommendations are to suspend singing.
- ➤ **Post service reception** Please move directly to Luther Hall or outside for any gathering when you leave the worship space please do not pause or gather immediately outside the worship space (Narthex).

We will continue to make our time together safe for everyone. This plan will be revised and adapted as appropriate. May the peace of Christ be with you always. God's blessings to you.

You can always call me or any council member or Pastor with any concerns, comments or ideas. We need to hear from you on many different subjects. We would like to hear how you feel about coming back to in-person service, and what would help you feel safe. Another subject would be, what do you want to see Zion doing and you doing in the future.

We have completed the Pastor's and the Sunday school office with new paint and carpet. We are finishing up the entrance way which leads into Luther Hall from the parking lot. The gym has been repainted and new baseboard put on. Dick has completed the cleaning of the carpet area in the church. The roof will be repaired this summer and the parking lot patched and resealed. The retirees are working on the grounds. If anyone is able to help with this, please contact Dave Palumbo. We will be giving a shout out when we set a time for mulching around the church. Please pray the following prayer:


O Lord, help us in the battle against the coronavirus. Give us strength and grace that we may persevere until the combat has ended in victory Amen.

The Zion Food Pantry client numbers have increased by 12 households in April. This reflects an increase of 20 adults, with and without children over March. The number of children doubled from 15 to 30. Therefore, it appears we are servicing new families with children. However, the total number of people served indicates some of our regulars are not coming. During April we served 159 people from 89 households. The April client breakdown was as follows: 30 children (0-17), 69 adults (18-59), and 60 seniors (age 60+).

Thank You to the younger members and teens who have stepped up to cover for us older volunteers who cannot attend because of medical conditions.

FOOD PANTRY needs cereal, spaghetti sauce, crunchy peanut butter, jelly (any flavor except grape), canned fruit, variety pack of flavored instant oatmeal, and soups of all kinds (except tomato).

RESOURCE MINISTRY

God's peace and love be with you, today and always. In these trying times, we continue to pray and act fiscally responsibly to help Zion address and weather this health crisis while continuing to adequately support our ministries.

Thank you one and all! In the face of the current climate, your support enabled our financial results to improve significantly in April. Our monthly giving rate increased 61% compared to 2019, and our YTD giving rate has improved by 28% vs 2019. April's rate was 8.4% greater than March, with both being substantial improvements over our January-February results and more consistent with our results from Fall 2019.

Considering this rate of giving and budget expenses, our April results produced a budget deficit of \$6,676.78,; the majority being produced by payment of our \$5,000 commitment to Habitat for Humanity. Our YTD budget deficit of \$26,279.11 is offset by 2019 surplus of \$7,646.18 to produce 2020 YTD Net Income of -\$18,632.93 (deficit). This result is not unexpected and is alignment with our approved 2020 budget projections.

Our current plans call for a resumption of in-person worship for June 7, but we want to assure you that Zion will also continue to function in a virtual manner and we will continue to support our planned ministry functions. We encourage your continued financial support to accomplish these objectives and count our blessings that you are able assist to the extent that you can manage. We realize this is a troubling time and that significant impacts to your personal finances may be occurring.

Update: Our newly established electronic giving options have been working very well. A significant number of Zion members are now utilizing this option, accounting for 20% of total April giving. If you are not currently using this option but would like to try it, you may get started using the



Did you read last month's article? Was your curiosity piqued? Did you do anything in response? Did you do anything to be part of the solution?

Let us begin this month in prayer, using the Prayerful Commitment from Chapter One

God, open my eyes that I might see my church as You see it. Let me see where change needs to take place, even if it is painful to me. And use me, I pray, to be an instrument of that change whatever the cost. Amen. p8

Can I really commit to being open to whatever God wants; even if it isn't what I want, or it costs me my comfort, time, or resources? Will I be like some, who drop and run at the first sign of challenge or different way of doing things? God, give all of us the strength and courage to listen and then trust.

Our author, president of one of the largest Christian resource companies in the world, was called in to help a church that had seen their weekly attendance drop to 83. He notes that the reality was that most of the members did not want him there. They didn't want someone telling them something they didn't want to hear – that they were no longer a healthy church. Our authors asks us:

If your church was given a "physical exam" today, what do you think the doctor's diagnosis would be: healthy, slightly sick, very sick, or dying? Why? P9

Our author states that it is rare for long-term members to see the slow erosion in their church. Growth comes quickly, but usually decline is slow. This gradual erosion is the worst kind of decline because they don't see it taking place before their eyes and there is no sense of urgency to change things to reverse the decline. The picture below is from a gathering of the Sunday School class of 2006. Take a look, reminisce, then answer the question below the picture.



What was your church like twenty years ago versus today? Do you see any signs of gradual erosion? P15

Our author says the most pervasive and common thread of declining churches is that they live with the past as something to be restored. They cling to the way things used to be. They long for the good old days. They are not clinging to biblical truths. They are not clinging to serving others as God commands.

Instead, they are fighting for the past to return. They hear others telling them times are different and things need to change, but they are resisting and wearing down the visionaries. They want what they want – after all, they are the ones who still come to church. They are focusing on their own needs instead of the needs of others.


Are there any areas in your church where you are resisting change simply because of your own preference? P24
