MINISTRY REPORTS



CARING MINISTRY

During the month of June the Food Pantry served 65 households as follows: seniors (age 60+) 64, adults (age 18 - 59) 38, and children (birth -

17) 15. The total number of people served during June was 117. During June we served 5 fewer households and 19 less people than during May. The number of adults dropped by 14 and the children dropped from 24 to 15. The senior numbers increased by 4, but still remain relatively constant, while the number of adults with minor children decreased by 11, looking more like before

the pandemic. Therefore, our client mix has decreased among adults with minor children, but stayed about the same among adults without minor children. However, we have fewer clients than last month and a year ago. I think stimulus checks might have affected these drops; therefore, as the checks stop we may see a return to previous client numbers.

As we continue on, I expect our new food distribution procedures to continue for the foreseeable future. Please wear your mask and stay as safe as possible. The Food Pantry dates for August are the 4th and 18th.

Dear Lord, give us the will and perseverance to maintain our practice of social distancing and mask wearing during the next thirty days, which will be critical in preventing increased infections and remaining open to serve our community. Amen.

Book Discussion Forum, by Linda Weidenbach

Here is an update on our autumn through winter Book Discussion forum.

Last spring, a member of our group suggested our first book for the season, on October 2nd, be *Truman*, a history of our 33rd president, by David McCullough. We had just read *The Pioneers* (also by McCullough), a history of Ohio in the past two centuries, and we agreed on *Truman*, in light of our upcoming presidential election.

Now, *Truman* is a long......book......992 pages!!! If you start reading on August 1st, you can finish by October 2nd by reading 16 pages per day J.) I am on page 191.

McCullough has been thorough so far, covering Truman's ancestors and his upbringing. He served in World War I and the book includes a letter Truman wrote from Europe about his concern for his family and others during the then-ongoing influenza pandemic. It was caused by an H1N1 virus with genes of avian origin. Although there is not universal consensus regarding where the virus originated, it spread worldwide during 1918-1919 (Ref. CDC). By this time in the book (page 191), Truman has entered politics. Pictures from the era show men and women wearing more hats than we see people wearing now (not including caps ©).



I've looked ahead in the book at the 1948 election to find differences and similarities between then and now. Certainly, mail-in ballots will be more popular considering the pandemic. However, my gleaning brought up more similarities than differences in the challenges faced between these 72 years (1948-2020). The leaders of our country and all countries face many of the same problems. And whoever will lead in 2021-2025 will need our prayers.

Join us on October 2nd even if you don't read the book. We would be glad to have you. The meeting format (in person, zoom, etc.) is to be determined. Our discussion forum is open to ideas from all genres and subjects, fiction and non-fiction. Ongoing dates include: November 6th, December 4th, January 1ST, February 5th, and March 5th.




WHAT IS A QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTION?

A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a wonderful way to support the life-giving ministries of the ELCA and receive key tax benefits.

Here's how it works:

Recent changes to the law have raised, from 70½ to 72, the age at which you are required to withdraw from your Individual Retirement Account (IRA) a certain amount of money known as your Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs). These distributions are taxed as they are withdrawn. Despite this change in the law, a QCD continues to allow taxpayers over age 70½ to donate to charities directly from their IRA, which would allow you to avoid federal income tax on this money while supporting the ministries of the ELCA.

WHY SHOULD I USE A QCD?

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS?

- QCDs are tax-exempt
- Because these distributions aren't added to your income, you may qualify for lower Medicare premiums and Social Security tax rates.
- They count toward your RMDs if you are 72 or older.*
- · You don't have to change your will or trust.
- The transactions are simple to record on your 1040 form.
- Your gifts immediately support ELCA programs in need.
