MINISTRY REPORTS



CARING MINISTRY

During the month of November, the Food Pantry served 163 households as follows: seniors (age 60+) 109, adults (age 18 - 59) 160, and children (birth -

17) 72. The total number of people served during October was 341. During November we served 48 more households consisting of 119 more people than October. We had 97 more clients than one year ago, November 2019.

This is the largest number of clients I have seen, which was a combination of an annual Thanksgiving increase and desperate people which have lost their income. Unless people get some relief, hunger dependence will keep increasing as we move through the Christmas holiday and into the New Year. Thank you for your continued support.

The following is a summary of all we accomplished this Christmas (keeping Christ in Christmas!):

- We sponsored 3 families from Zion's Food pantry providing gifts and gift cards for each family from their wish lists to give them a Merry Christmas and help with their food needs!
- We sponsored 4 families from the North Canton CARES Team providing gifts and gift cards for each family from their wish lists to give them a Merry Christmas and help with their food needs! We received a text from Kristen Gaskell of the North Canton CARES Team to let us know how much these gifts were appreciated "Many families have been brought to tears. Thank you for helping brighten their lives."


Pastor's Ponderings January, 2021



A new calendar year:

- New focus of conversations.

In the last months of 2020 in our Adult Sunday School Class we spent some time discovering the biblical basis and God-focused purpose of The Lutheran Liturgy – that form of worship in which we participate each week. We looked at how it impacted us in our life, and how it formed who we are as God's children. We looked at what we like, what we found confusing, what we would like to see, what we would like to



update, and what it has to do with the church today. We also discussed how our liturgy affects church growth.

Regarding church growth, we did not talk about how the church is in decline (it's not.) We did not talk



about how church attendance is down, even though the population is up. We did not talk about how to get more people in the pews. Nope, we didn't talk about any of that. Why not? Well, because we recognized that church growth has nothing to do with attendance.

Instead we talked about what "church growth" actually means:

- † It's about how we impact our community. (If they can live without us, we failed.)
- The It's about how many of us are increasing our knowledge of Christ through deliberate study (even, and especially, as adults.)
- The It's about how good we are at developing pastors from within our congregants. (We've developed only about ten in our 206 years.)
- The It's about how well we proclaim God's love through word and deed (how Sunday impacts others the rest of the week.)

There are more, of course. What say you? Won't you come on Sunday after church and share? We can't grow without you!

I'm looking forward to how we grow in 2021. Are you? Graciously, Pr. William


DIAPER NEED is the lack of a sufficient supply of diapers to keep an infant or toddler clean, dry and healthy.



WHY DO WE WANT TO HELP?







Many families in need of diapers are working parents. A low-income job doesn't always cover basic needs.

Without an adequate supply of diapers, babies cannot participate in child care. Without childcare, parents cannot work.

Many children in our community are impacted by the lack of diapers often suffering from reoccurring rashes and urinary infections creating stress on families.

Babies need an average of 8 to 10 diapers a day costing \$85 or more per month.

Stewardship Moment - Know how much God loves you

Focus scripture: Luke 15:11-32 Christ's parable of the Prodigal Father (some <u>erroneously</u> say, Prodigal Son)

Ooh, did that get your attention? To see who was the true prodigal, let us first define "prodigal". It means; reckless, uncontrolled, extravagant.

Is it the younger son who claims his father dead (asking for his share of the estate) and goes on a spending spree, that is reckless, uncontrolled and extravagant? Nope, not him.



Is it the elder son who wishes his brother dead (he wants his brother to be excommunicated from the family) that is reckless, extravagant and uncontrolled? Nope, not him.

No, it is the father who is the prodigal! The father who...

- ...recklessly gave away half of his wealth while he was still alive and in need of it!
- ...uncontrollably lost his dignity by running toward the son who betrayed him!
- ...extravagantly robed his despicable son in the family ornaments!






Yes, it is the father who recklessly, uncontrollably and extravagantly loves both sons. You see, this parable isn't about which son is the better son, or about which son we should emulate – frankly, neither of them were very worthy of the loving father that bore them.
