Stewardship Moment – know God's purpose

Focus scripture: Luke 7:31-35, where Jesus compares what people are saying about John and him.

It seems people find something wrong with both John (accused demon) and Jesus (accused glutton and drunkard) that prevents them from hearing what those two men are saying about God and God's purpose.

Jesus claims the people are like children playing games, the girls don't want to play

the game the boys are proposing, and the boys don't want to play the game the girls are proposing. Perhaps both sides need to be a little more flexible and less self-centered.



And isn't that what God is trying to tell us through John and Jesus? Hey children, God says, a little less self-focus, a little more compassion for the other side.

So, what is God's purpose? Might it be that God...

- ❖ ...is a parent who wants his children to play well with each other? (1 Corinthians 12:12-36)
- ❖ ...has some rules by which we are to live so that things go well for all of us? (Exodus 219:3-20:20)
- ...created the world so that all of us might be fruitfull? (Gensis 1:28-30)
- ❖ ...delights in giving us the kingdom, so we are not to worry about our needs (Luke 12:32-34)

Jesus ended our focus scripture (Luke 7:31-35) saying that wisdom is cleared of suspicion by her children. We, God's (wisdom's) children, validate God when we believe Jesus' words of love and forgiveness and follow his instructions for life in community with one another. An example of how we do this is found in the words of absolution we encounter at every worship service:

"In the mercy of almighty God, Jesus Christ was given to die for us, and for his sake God forgives us all our sins."

You see, God is the one who benefits by our being made whole through Jesus' acts of love and selflessness. God's purpose is that we might have life and have it abundantly (John 10:10). We validate this love and forgiveness by believing it and living a life of abundant love, grace, and forgiveness; both for ourselves and of others.

You are chosen. You are loved. You are forgiven.

CARING MINISTRY

During the month of January, the Food Pantry




served 122 households as follows: seniors (age 60+) 94, adults (age 18 - 59) 128 and children (birth -17) 68. The total number of people served during January was 290. During January we served 31 fewer households, and 60

fewer people than December. The number of adults with minor children stayed at 62, while the children increased by 1. The numbers in the category: seniors without minor children decreased by 6, while seniors with minor children dropped by 1. The number of adults without minor children decreased by 54; however, this category shows who are most affected by the pandemic. We had 60 fewer clients than last month, and 122 more than January 2020. Pre-COVID client numbers were 42% less than current numbers based on January 2020 and 2021 results. The need remains great, especially among the adults.



March Item of the Month – we would like to collect 60 rolls of paper

towels and 60 cans of hearty/chunky soup for our pantry families this month. Thanks to eve-



wash last month. We always need our staple items - peanut butter, creamed soups, jelly (except grape), pasta, spaghetti sauce, canned fruit, and boxed cereal or instant oatmeal because these items are given out regularly. Thanks for your support!

RESOURCE MINISTRY

God's blessings to you all! January has been a continuation of our strong 2020 spiritual and financial performance. If you have been in church in February, you have seen evidence of additional positive changes occurring in our infrastructure. The new coffee bar/exchange area in Luther Hall has been christened and we have implemented the Equal Exchange Ministry which will support it as well as the congregation. In addition, an access door has been installed in the gym to improve efficiency for storing tables, chairs, etc when not in use in gym or other locations. We will continue to upgrade our facility to improve the effectiveness of our designated ministries.

Revisiting 2020 after some year-end adjustment, Zion's December giving rate increased 77% from November and was 13% greater than December 2019 which was an outstanding month. This continued our 2020 trend of significant positive increases in spiritual energy and financial support, THANK YOU's are in order! Our 2020 year-end result provided a 34% increase vs 2019. This support will allow us to continue to operate in a fiscally responsible manner while enabling Zion to address and support our expanding portfolio of community outreach ministries.

Our restated December budget results generated a very significant positive impact to our year-end results insuring a breakeven condition. Your support enabled us to eliminate the predicted and authorized 2020 budget deficit, assuring we have left 2020 on a solid financial basis.

January 2021 exceeded 2020 by 56% keeping our total giving on par with the stronger non-December months of 2020. This gives us solid base to fund our ministry plans when we are to begin implemen-

tation with relaxation of pandemic constraints.

We are so happy and inspired to have your support for Zion's ministries and to know that we can address the current health and social crisis's by trusting in God's blessings and exercising appropriate personal responsibility.

BOOK OF THE MONTH:



Easter Egg Tree for Wernle Youth & Family Treatment Center



We will be supporting Wernle Youth and Family this month with our Easter Egg Tree.

There are eggs on our Easter Tree with monetary amounts of \$5 and \$10. The money collected will go to Wernle's program to sponsor a child's allowance. The kids at Wernle receive a \$5 weekly allowance that they can use or put into their private account. Our goal is to sponsor the yearly allowance for at least two kids which totals \$480 (yearly sponsorship is \$240 and 6 months is \$120).

There are also eggs with \$10 gift cards to Wendy's, McDonalds, Taco Bell and WalMart that are given to the kids at Wernle.

If you are unable to come to church and take egg tags from the tree but would still like to help out, you can drop off or mail a cash donation or \$10 gift card to the church.

A note from Debbie Fox: Wernle is near and dear to mine and Dean's hearts. We have both spent time there along with our son, Jeremy, and have seen all the good they do for the kids who have had some terrible and heart-breaking life circumstances – things we can't even imagine. These kids are given a second chance and taught self-worth and shown so much love. Jeremy and I have even had the pleasure of meeting some of the kids and having a meal with them during a weekend mission trip. After the meal, Jeremy and a couple of Zion's other youth got to play basketball in the gym at Wernle. The trip we took made a lasting impact on Jeremy and the other kids. We all realized how blessed we are and how important it is to give back and help in any way we can, no matter how big or small, because it really makes a difference. Dean and I hope that you will consider helping Wernle this month. If the congregation reaches the goal of sponsoring two kids' allowances, we will match a third kid's annual allowance.


