

Stewardship Moment – Live in God's Relationship

Focus scripture: Luke 10:1-11, in which Jesus teaches his disciples (students, including us) how to pray and to persevere in prayer.



In this Lord's Prayer, Jesus says to pray "Your kingdom come." Jesus isn't telling us to get ready to enter God's kingdom at death, he is saying to pray that God's kingdom happens here and now; in this place and at this time.

This isn't the rapture that we hear some others speaking about. No, this kingdom come thing is something much deeper, much harder to imagine, much more in our hands to bring about. You see, the kingdom happens whenever and wherever God's will is done (see the same pray expressed in Matthew 6:9-14, specifically verse 10.)

So, God wants to be present with us – always and now. God isn't waiting for us to die so we can be together. We can have God's presence with us now. We get that presence when we are in relationship with God. Much like earthly parents desire a relationship with their children, so too, God desires a relationship with us. Much like earthly parents who have benevolent desires for their children, so too, God's desires are for our good. Much like earthly parents who are better able to relate with us when we acknowledge their good direction upon our life, so too, God is better able to relate to us when we acknowledge God's leadership.

Jesus continues by telling us to ask, and it will be given us, so that we may have everything we need to do God's will and make God's kingdom come. It is God's good pleasure to provide for us that which we need to do God's will in our lives. Remember after all, Jesus said; Just as you saw a stranger hungry, or thirsty, or naked, or imprisoned and did something, you did it to me (Matthew 25:31-46.)





Now, go help bring in the kingdom of God – here – now – for everyone! There is much that remains to be done.



That's kingdom come, that's the work for which God is waiting to provide us all we need. That's how we build relationship with Jesus – by welcoming and serving him.

MINISTRY REPORTS

CARING MINISTRY




During the month February, the Food Pantry served 97 households as follows: seniors (age 60+) 68, adults (age 18 - 59) 103 and children (birth - 17) 75. Together We Can! The total number of people served during February was

246. During February we served 25 fewer households, and 44 fewer people than January. The number of adults with minor children increased to 67, while the children increased to 75. The number of seniors without minor children dropped to 65, while seniors with minor children increased to 3. The number of adults without minor children decreased to 36; however, the adult group still remains the most affected by the pandemic. We had 44 fewer clients than last month, and 109 more than February 2020.

February 2021 was an 80% increase over the February 2020 client level. The numbers are lower

than December and January, but still show great need. The seniors always stay within one or two each month going back from when I started this report; therefore, they are locked into an income level controlled by inflation and food stamp availability. We will know the economy is getting better as the adult group drops to pre COVID levels. February could have had fewer because of the

April Item of the Month – we would like to collect 60 rolls of toilet paper and



this month. Thanks

to everyone who donated paper towels and hearty/chunky soup last month. We always need our staple items - peanut butter,

creamed soups, jelly (except grape), pasta, spaghetti sauce, canned fruit, and boxed cereal or instant oatmeal because these items are given out regularly. Thanks for your support!

Zion's Shared Goods Place (fka Clothing Closet)



is in need of household items such as; bath towels, hand towels, tea towels, dishes, pots, pans, etc. We need all sizes of toddlers, girls and boys clothes and jackets. We are also in need of

men's jeans in all sizes and shoes.

WORSHIP MINISTRY



The Worship Ministry is busy planning current worship services under Covid, yet still planning for the future:

• Holy Week Services are planned and ready for you to worship in a meaningful and spiritual way. Join us for Maundy Thursday (7:30 pm on April 1), Good Friday (7:30 pm on April 2), and Easter Sunday (9 am on April 4). Similar to Ash Wednesday, Luther Hall will be set up with a live video relay of the Worship Space in the church for each of these Services (except for Palm Sunday since the Wednesday Service before will have palms) so those wanting more space around them can worship in confidence. When appropriate, communion will be served by Pastor to those in

Luther Hall. There will be NO Wednesday evening service (March 31) during this week. Wednesday indoor evening services will resume at 7pm on April 7.

- Our Worship Ministry began discussions on post-Covid church services. While many changes needed to be made due to Covid, these changes will be re-evaluated for continued safety and also for a meaningful Sunday Service experience. Considerations include re-establishing Choir and Bell Choir components, and re-establishing two services based on need (Traditional and Contemporary) or possibly establishing a Blended Service (with both traditional and praise hymns).
- The Wednesday Service is planned to continue through this summer and then re-evaluated in the fall based on need and number attending. (In the meantime, indoor Wednesday Services will continue with OUTDOOR Wednesday Services beginning on May 5.)
- Discussion on developing a policy for paying for Special Music during church service. A sliding scale of payment was discussed based on the following considerations: type of service (Easter, Christmas, Regular Sunday); music requiring extra practice with organist or stand alone music; number of people playing/singing; vocal vs. instrumental; following good stewardship procedures while being fair to all parties. Other churches will be contacted for their policy.

At our April monthly meeting, we will continue to work on the above items. Also, our Ministry will discuss Mothers' Day and Pentecost Services, develop procedures for a last minute Pulpit Supply need (due to illness); and the dismissal procedure at the end of Sunday Services.



What is the difference between the Christ Candle and the Paschal Candle?

Christ Candle

- A white candle that some congregations place in the center of the Advent Wreath
 - It is not an ELCA established practice
 - There is no historical purpose used by some congregations for their own purpose
 - ° There is no liturgical purpose
- It is lit on Christmas Day (not Christmas Eve) and during the weeks of Christmas when the Advent Wreath is used
- There is no provision for use outside being part of the Advent Wreath

Paschal Candle

- It represents Christ's triumph over the darkness of sin and death.
- It is renewed each year at the Vigil of Easter (Saturday before Resurrection Sunday):
 - ° which begins in darkness, symbolic of the darkness of the sepulcher that held the crucified Christ
 - o where a new fire is kindled, representing the Risen Christ, the Light of the World
 - o it is lit from this new fire
- It is used:
 - ° during 50 days of Easter; the period from Easter Sunday through the Day of Pentecost
 - ° at Baptisms (placed near the Baptismal Font), the candle presented to the baptized is lit from the Paschal Candle
 - o at Funerals (placed near the head of the casket) as a reminder that "In our Baptism we have already died and been raised with Christ." (Romans 6:3-5)
 - after the Day of Pentecost, the unlit Paschal Candle is placed near the Baptismal Font as a visual reminder that in our Baptism we are crucified and resurrected with Christ.

A note from Jim Fiddler:

The Stark County Humane Society (SCHS) is a private, 501(c)(3) charitable organization dedicated to rescuing stray, sick, abused and abandoned dogs and cats, restoring them to physical health, and securing their adoption into loving homes. It receives no funds from any governmental agency and relies totally on the generosity of the community through memberships, donations, bequests and fundraisers.

The SCHS continues to be a lead shelter in the entire country in terms of number and percentage of successful adoptions, animals successfully rehabilitated, and having one of the lowest euthanasia rates in the United States. Despite the problems created by the Coronavirus Pandemic, the SCHS improved its shelter infrastructure, enhanced its veterinary capacity and utilized modern technological tools and imaginative use of social media to continue to successfully help those animals in need.

Its success is due to the support of the community and the hard work of dedicated staff, veterinarians, employees and, until the advent of COVID-19 restrictions, volunteers. Zion Lutheran's Congregation has for several years supported the SCHS through financial and in-kind contributions, through its response to the Society's published "Wish List" and through volunteer work, which it is hoped will be resuming in the next few months. Zion Lutheran expects to one day soon see the return of our furry friends to Zion's Vacation Bible School and other events as Zion continues to support efforts "To Speak for Those Who Cannot Speak for Themselves".

PRESIDING BISHOP

GOD will TRANSFORM THIS CHURCH





The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. That's our name. At least two parts of our name, "Evangelical" and "Church," are either misunderstood or an outright stumbling block for a significant percentage of the American population.

Pew Research reports that over one-fifth of the U.S. public—and a third under 30—are religiously unaffiliated. These are the "nones." The religiously unaffiliated, whether never churched or dechurched, don't have a favorable impression of church. They see it as extremist, full of hypocrites, judgmental, anti-science, anti-intellectual, dogmatic, overly concerned about other people's morality, naïve and out of touch. Ouch.

In the eyes of the nones, the ELCA gets lumped in with everyone else. Though we aren't perfect, and some of the characteristics of church apply to us at various times, we have a theology based on a liberating gospel of Jesus Christ that is the *euangelion*—the good news. The "Evangelical" in our name points to the transforming love of Jesus, to reconciliation, to freedom, to grace. It's expansive, for everyone and all creation. It doesn't require our effort or our merit, only our trust in God's promise.

It's not naïve. Scripture, Martin Luther, Dietrich Bonhoeffer and others were clear-eyed about the reality of human sin and brokenness and the devastating consequences for individuals, groups of people and creation that result. There is judgment, but it is God's, not ours. Our evangelical understanding of God's word is that it is both law and gospel, judgment and promise. We aren't an everything goes, antinomian church.

I remember the light bulbs going off in my catechism students' heads when learning about grace. Does it give us license to do anything we want? Paul had to address the same line of thinking in the letter to the Romans. No. Grace makes it possible to be honest with ourselves and face our sin because the Spirit grants us the space, time and desire to turn from our sin to the source of life.

Our evangelical witness is full of paradox—we are simultaneously saint and sinner. Yes, there is hypocrisy in the church—welcome to humanity! But there is also beauty and love poured by the Spirit into sometimes stubborn and broken hearts. There is law and gospel. We are at once perfectly free and lord of all and bound and servant of all (Luther's *The Freedom of a Christian*).

Our evangelical witness is that God called the creation good; that we have been given the gift of curiosity that compels us to study the natural world, to engage in scientific research. The more we know about creation, the closer we draw to the Creator. We aren't anti-intellectual—Luther was a college professor after all.

I happen to know some millennials who had conversations with their none neighbors. These conversations were open and engaged. The none neighbors carried the above-mentioned perceptions of church, but they also knew that their millennial friends served as Young Adults in Global Mission and were active in their congregation. The nones were trying to reconcile their perceptions of church with their experience of actual Lutherans—one of whom is a scientist. Without that relationship, the nones would never have known a true evangelical witness to the liberating good news of Jesus.

In this issue you have read about Future Church (page 20). God is calling us into this exciting mission, and the Spirit will activate each of us to invite people to know the way of Jesus and discover community, justice and love. The ELCA can hold up our evangelical witness, which is an alternative face of Christianity—not for institutional survival, but so that more people will experience the deep love of Jesus, be transformed and liberated by that love and "work for justice and peace" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, Holy Baptism).

This mission will take all of us, and it means actual relationships with real people led by an incarnational God. I believe that God will transform this church. †


Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday and proceeds through the four days of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Resurrection Sunday. This is the defining season of Christianity and you are encouraged to grow closer to your Savior by fully participating in all four worship experiences.



Palm Sunday, Wednesday March 24 at 7:00 pm and Sunday March 28 at 9:00 am

On this day, united with Christians around the world, we mark Jesus' triumphant entry in to the holy city of Jerusalem to complete the work of our salvation. We follow his footsteps as we enter the church, our Jerusalem, acclaiming the one whose throne was the cross.

Worship Pattern: we gather with palms and joy to hear the reading of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. Worship continues in the usual pattern.



Maundy Thursday, April 1 at 7:30 pm


On this night we begin the Three Days during which we participate once again in the saving power of Jesus' passing over from death into life. The Maundy Thursday service includes the words of Jesus' new commandment (madatum, from which Maundy comes) to love one another. On this night in which Jesus was handed over to death we also gather around the Lord's supper. At the service conclusion, the altar area is stripped of furnishings as a sign of Jesus' abandonment.¹


Worship Pattern: we gather in the gym to experience the Living Last Supper and join with First Communicants in receiving Christ's body and blood. Service concludes with silent procession to the worship space where we sing *Were You There*, followed by the solemnity of stripping the chancel as Psalm 22 is chanted.



Good Friday, April 2 at 7:30 pm

On this night, the journey continues through the Three Days of Jesus' suffering, death, and resurrection. At the heart of this service is the passion reading according to John, which celebrates Christ's victory on the cross. As Jesus draws all people to himself, we pray for the whole world for which Christ died. Finally, we honor the cross as the sign of forgiveness, healing, and salvation. With all God's people we are invited to before this mystery of faith. Christ has died, so that we may live. ¹






Resurrection Sunday, April 4 at 9:00
