



Stewardship Moment - Rejoice in God's Presence

Focus scripture: Luke 15:1-10 the parable of the lost sheep and lost coin.



The church leaders were grumbling against Jesus because he was attracting the "wrong" kind of people – sinners and tax collectors! What's the matter with Jesus? Did he not know that church was for the perfect people? What was he trying to prove when he had dinner with sinners? Those kind of people were not welcome inside the doors of the church; they stunk up the place.

But wait; are not those the very people to whom Jesus pronounced good news? Jesus said he came to bring good news to the poor, release to the captive, recovery of sight to the blind, and freedom to the oppressed.

The church, however, was busy about keeping up appearances in their great buildings, and using the backs of the poor (widows) to do so (Mark 12:40 - 13:2.) It is no wonder that they were upset with Jesus; he was disturbing their church order.

Jesus came to shake things up, to turn the ways of the world on its head, and to demonstrate that God favored those whom society excluded, marginalized, or oppressed.



- → We can rejoice that God provides abundantly – consider there is enough air for all living creatures, and an ecology of interdependence, all created by God.
- + We can rejoice that God has provided for all people, well-behaved and not so well-behaved alike. There is nothing we do to deserve or merit God's provision, it is God's good pleasure to provide for us.



→ We can rejoice that God loves us and seeks us out. We can rejoice with God when the "sinners and tax collectors" are found.

Jesus desires that we welcome in the least of these; the sinners and tax collectors, poor, marginalized, and oppressed. We can rejoice with them as we participate alongside them in God's kingdom. We can rejoice with them in God's presence; for where two or more are gathered, there Jesus is amongst them (us.)

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT:

April is the month of hope and renewal. Spring is upon us and we are enveloped by the promise of the Lenten Season leading up to Palm Sunday and Easter. Given the support expressed by the Congregation, at Meetings in October and February, for the Annual Budget and proposed projects, the Council is proceeding in an expeditious and prudent manner to implement plans concerning the renovation of the kitchen and sale of the parsonage that will leave us better positioned to accomplish Zion's Mission of demonstrating love for our Divine Creator through service to others. We promise to keep the Congregation informed of pertinent developments in a timely manner.

Contemplation of Easter and the sacrifice God made for us leaves us awestruck by God's overpowering, all encompassing, unstoppable, incontrovertible love for each and every creature in the vast universe He has created. He has individuals insist on having lunch with us at least once per week. He has individuals call us to ask for our help in dealing with a matter that they obviously could take care of on their own. And He gives us countless opportunities to volunteer with organizations dedicated to making life better for those less fortunate.

God does not put us to the test He put His Son through. All He asks is that we be people who do whatever we can to aid the victims of war, famine, injustice, abuse, neglect or illness. Simply put, that we strive to do things pleasing in His sight.

Lord, thank You for the gift of Your Son. Make us ever grateful for Your enduring love. In Jesus' Name we pray. Amen.

MINISTRY REPORTS

CARING MINISTRY



During February Zion served 31 households with minor children, within this group, 10 clients were seniors and 57 were adults. The com-Together We Can! bined number of children served was 100. During

February, we served 103 households without minor children and within this group, 114 clients were seniors and 79 were adults. Therefore, during February Zion served 134 Households consisting of 360 clients. February accounted for 32 additional households and 76 additional clients over January 2022. As a comparison in February 2021 we served 97 households consisting of 246 clients representing a 38% increase in households and a 46% increase in clients over last year. The need trend is increasing and not decreasing as I thought last month; therefore, we need to assure our

resources are adequate to support an increasing service level. We appear to have a larger number of seniors.

Thank you everyone for your continued support of all our Caring Ministry Teams.

Since we feed a large number of clients every month, I find it appropriate to add a meal prayer that my mother taught me as a child. I looked it up and the prayer is a variation of Psalm 145:15-16 depending on the translation:

The eyes of all wait upon thee; and give us thy meat in due season. Thou open thine hand, and satisfy the desire of every living thing. Amen.

FOOD PANTRY—April's items of the month are



toothpaste and jelly. We always need our staple items – peanut butter. creamed



soups, jelly (except grape), pasta, spaghetti sauce, canned fruit, and boxed cereal or instant oatmeal because these items are given out regularly. Thanks for your support!

We had another good turn out with the people from the Food Pantry on Tuesday. It was a really great month. So we especially need young boys clothes now.

COMFORT GIVERS



We were able to complete 7 quilts for the month of March. We hope you are enjoying seeing the finished product in Luther Hall. We change them out after each time we meet. Last year the Lutheran World Relief reached 361,225 neighbors in need

in 19 countries with 122,400 quilts and 3,230 blankets. They sent over 60,030 personal care kits, 103,880 school kits, 38,850 baby care kits, 915 fabric kits and 31,920 masks. So, if you would like to help increase these numbers, we meet every 2nd and 4th Thursday of the month from 10 am to 12

pm. You can also help by bringing in items we need for the different kits that we will be putting together.

We have been able to help two more people with prayer lap blankets this past month. We have

included a thank you note from a recipient of a prayer shawl that she received in January. Let Darlene know if you have someone or if you would like to receive a prayer shawl or prayer lap blanket.

The Comfort Givers are going to be putting together baby kits again this year. Here is the list of items we are collecting:

- Light cotton T-shirts NO ONESIES
- Long or Short-sleeved gowns or sleepers WITHOUT FEET
- Blankets medium weight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn, MUST BE 36" to 52" SQUARE,
- Jacket or sweater or sweatshirt with hood, if no hood, include a baby cap
- Socks
- Sizes 6 to 24 months
- I have patterns, if you want to make a Baby Gown from T-shirts or a Hooded Baby Cape.

We sent 12 baby kits last year. We are hoping to send at least 24 this year. There will be more information and reminders about the kits in the coming newsletters and posted in Luther Hall. Thank you all for your support and we pray that it will continue on for these upcoming projects.

Dear Lord, we thank you for all you provide for us. We thank you for the opportunity to spread Your love by doing for others: by providing people with warm blankets, by providing comfort and love with the prayer shawls and lap blankets, and with the different kits we will be making to send overseas. Amen

- The recent leaks this past month were attributed to snow and ice buildup pushing up roof vents, resulting in snow melt entering the building. The vents will be re-set and resealed.
- New adjustable tables have arrived and being used by the Comfort Givers. The new tables are lighter, easier to adjust, and replace the need to use the blue blocks to elevate the tables.
- Several classroom floors have been stripped and re-waxed.
- The parsonage task force has been formed. We have identified two realtors, who have been scheduled to walk through the parsonage. Following the walk through, the realtors will present their marketing plans for the parsonage. The marketing plans will be evaluated on transactional costs, approach, and alignment with the council's direction to the task force. Following this a summary will be prepared with a recommendation to council from the task force.

Spring is in the Air! The sun is shining, the weather improving, and it is a glorious time to be alive and see what God is blessing us with every day. I trust you are staying safe in this Lenten Season and finding positive examples of God's blessings each day and sharing them with others. May the Lord's countless blessings shine upon you and grant you Peace!

I really wish I had a positive message about our 2022 giving results year-to-date in this start to the Lenten season but I don't. Financially, February 2022 Giving followed our disappointing trend

started in January. Our Giving was 44% less than February 2021 and 13% less than January. The combined results indicate we're approximately \$2,000 / week less than the level needed to support our operating budget which was approved at our October congregational meeting, resulting in a significant deficit to start 2022.

Our budget was developed on assumption that each member would contribute at a rate which would at least equal their 2021 giving level. Everyone's contributions are important, and each will be at a different amount, but it is obvious from the results to date that as a congregation, we are giving at much less than 2021 levels. Individually, you each know your giving rate and where you stand on positively contributing to our operating budget. We need your recognition and acknowledgement that sharing your financial resources are the foundation for our church operations and 2022 ministry functions. Positive corrections are needed, and we look forward to your generosity for resolution. We know that we can count on you and Thank You in advance for your support!

Lord, we are humbled by the resources you continue to make available to do your work at Zion and the inspiration you provide to recognize needs in our community and to appropriately respond to them. We do this in honor of your glorious name, Amen.

Our group is continuing to grow in numbers as we progress through the new year, As I stated last month, those who were present at our first meeting, decided that we would establish the "last" Saturday of each month, to gather together. Pastor's Ponderings April, 2022

While taking a look at our Sunday gospel readings for April, here is what I've been pondering:

• On April 3, the last Sunday in Lent, we will look on as Mary anoints Jesus in anticipation of his heading to Jerusalem and the cross. Judas criticizes Mary for using "costly perfume" that could have been sold and the money given to the poor. Jesus responds, "You will always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me." Jesus is right, we get side-tracked, we do not always have Jesus in our hearts or actions, and so we ignore our duty to serve God by serving the poor.



• On April 10, Palm Sunday, we will walk alongside the crowd as they welcome Jesus into town shouting Hosanna! (save us!) Like his disciples, we too do not understand these things at first. But, when Jesus is glorified on the cross and the empty tomb, we too understand about this God who loves us so much he sent his Son to repair the rift between us. Thanks be to God!



On April 17, Easter Day, we will walk with the women early in the morning as they go to the tomb and are amazed to find the stone rolled away and Jesus gone. Along with them, we will be "perplexed." Along with them, we will be reminded of his words to us that he would be raised on the third day. 




Happy Earth Day! Friday, April 22, 2022

Family and Current Housing

Tessica can't wait to give her family a permanent place to call home.

She and her children live in a rental house that they share with another a family member – a housing situation that only was ever intended to be temporary.

Tessica previously lived in government housing and then, after her income increased, she moved to an income-based apartment. As she worked hard to continue to increase her income, her rent also rose, making the two-bedroom apartment less affordable for her growing family. The property also was too small and had several issues that made it unsafe – namely, ongoing crime in the neighborhood.

A Bright Future

Since joining the Habitat partnership, Tessica has taken classes to prepare her to be a first-time homeowner, including courses about financial success and home maintenance.

She's excited to be able to provide her children with some stability by giving them a forever home. Once construction is complete, the Pryor family is looking forward to having a safe place to spend time together where they can do the things

Because of those problems, Tessica began looking for a new place to move during the pandemic, but she struggled to find something within her budget. While the current rental home she shares is more affordable, it still is located in a neighborhood with occasional shootings and other crime activity, and it is still overcrowded for the number of people who are living in the house



For British and her daughter, having a decent place to call home is going to be life-changing.

Currently, the Fennell family lives in a government-owned duplex that has significant plumbing and flooding issues. When someone uses the bathtub, the water runs down the walls of the duplex and into the living room. The water also has damaged the master bedroom, and the walls in the apartment are cracking. The flooring crumbles whenever it's mopped, and there's a drainage issue that leads to sewage backups in the tub and laundry. British also has concerns about her daughter being safe when she goes outside because of the amount of drug-

related activity in their neighborhood.

British learned about Habitat from a friend who built with Habitat out of state, and she loved the idea of not only getting to help build her own home but getting to help build other families' homes, too. She wanted to apply for the program, but she was concerned about being accepted because she had been working as a temp for a company for two years. She talked with her supervisor about being hired into the company, and now she's on staff at a plastics company in Canton and ready to own home.

"Everything came together at the same time," British said. 🏠

A Bright Future

Since joining the Habitat program, British has begun taking classes that will prepare her to be a first-time homeowner. She said she's excited to be able to purchase a home with Habitat because of the peace of mind she knows it will bring. It will be a different feeling being responsible for making repairs on her own – and being confident in her ability to do that – and not having to wait on someone else.

When British pictures life in her new Habitat home, she imagines putting family pictures up on the living room walls and being able to paint and decorate however she'd like. Her daughter, Navia, gets a big smile on her face when she talks about being able to cut their own grass in their own yard, plant things, and decorate the outside of their home.


Worship Pattern: we gather with palms and joy to hear the reading of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. Worship continues in the usual pattern.

On this night we begin the Three Days during which we participate once again in the saving power of Jesus' passing over from death into life. The Maundy Thursday service includes the words of Jesus' new commandment (madatum, from which Maundy comes) to love one another. On this night in which Jesus was handed over to death we also gather around the Lord's supper. At the service conclusion, the altar area is stripped of furnishings as a sign of Jesus' abandonment.¹

Worship Pattern: we gather in the gym to experience the Living Last Supper and join with First Communicants in receiving Christ's body and blood. Service concludes with silent procession to the worship space where we sing *Were You There*, followed by the solemnity of stripping the chancel as Psalm 22 is chanted.







ZION LUTHERAN CHURCH NORTH CANTON COMMUNITY GARDEN GUIDELINES

The following guidelines have been established and accepted by the members of this garden. Please read the guidelines and direct any questions or comments to the garden leader.

- 1. All gardeners are required to complete an application form. A non-refundable plot fee of \$25.00 for 4'x8' or \$15 for a 4'x4' are due with application.
- 2. Garden meetings and work parties are scheduled throughout the season. Plan to attend to get to know your fellow gardeners and help with garden upkeep and special projects. All gardeners are expected to participate. Please refer to the garden calendar for more information.
- 3. Keep your plot and the adjoining pathways tended. If your plot appears to be untended for a period of 2 weeks, and you haven't contacted the garden monitor, you will be contacted and your plot may be assigned to another gardener.
- 4. Call the garden monitor, Sue Whalen at 330-705-4696.
 - If you need help or if you will be out of town for an extended period of time.
 - If you plan to discontinue use of your space, let the monitor know as soon as possible so that your plot can be assigned to another gardener.
- 5. Plant tall plants and vines in places where they will not interfere with your neighbor's plot. Planting marijuana, illegal or invasive plants is strictly prohibited.
- 6. At the end of the gardening season, all dead plants and. non-plant materials (string, wire, wood, metal, plastic, etc.) must be removed and disposed of properly and all gardens left neat and tidy. If your garden is not cleaned up by the designated date, you could lose your gardening privileges for the next season. If you know you will keep the same plot next season, you may plant perennial vegetables., However, you MUST pay for the 2023 season by October 31, 2022.
- 7. Pick up litter when you see it.
- 8. Please put weeds and dead plants into the trash pin provided. Do not leave them in the pathway.
- 9. This is to be an organic garden. Using chemical fertilizers such as Miracle Gro, weed killers, like Round up or Weed Be Gone or insecticides are prohibited.
- 10. Do not pick anything from another person's plot without their express approval.
- 11. Please do not leave the water on unattended. When finished gardening for the day, return tools to the shed and lock the shed up before leaving the garden. Make sure garden gate is closed to prevent animals from getting inside.
- 12. Smoking and chewing tobacco is not allowed. Gardener agrees to no hazardous materials including but not limited to, flammable materials or liquids, fireworks, pyrotechnic devices, explosives, poisonous materials or plants, strong acids or caustics or ANY animals be brought onto the premises or used in any way in or around the Garden,
- 13. Drugs, alcohol, radios, boom boxes and fires are not allowed. There is "Dog Parking" outside the garden gate to clip your dog while you garden. Please clean up after your pet.
- 14. Supervise children in the garden and surrounding property. Please be cautious of the play area. The church is not responsible for any liability that occurs in connection with the play area. Use at your own risk.
- 15. Report theft, vandalism and unusual activity to the garden monitor and the North Canton police.
- 16. Use common courtesy, be considerate of your gardening neighbors and enjoy.
