Message from our President:

September is the month in which we anticipate the cooler weather of Fall and get back to a more hectic schedule after what we traditionally refer to as the leisurely, recreational, "hazy, lazy, crazy days" of Summer. At Zion's "End of Summer" party on September 3 we'll relax, sample good food, enjoy the company of others, count our Blessings (which we should be doing every day of the year) and contemplate new efforts to spread the Gospel to the community.

In the ELCA, Sunday, September 10, 2023 marks the 10th anniversary of "God's work. Our hands." Sunday, our annual day of service. On that day we at Zion will be wearing our yellow "God's work. Our hands." Tee shirts as we engage in efforts to "Matter to the community by showing the Love of Jesus Christ." This day of service is an extension of the work we are already doing to serve our fellow beings and is consistent with an ongoing effort to become a part of the community. For Lutherans, confidence in God's Grace is the foundation of a conviction that a life in Jesus Christ is inextricably intertwined with service to others.

As Christians, we hold the firm belief that all of the resources - financial, physical, emotional, spiritual- in our possession have been entrusted to our care by God and that He expects conscientious and judicious endeavors on our part to be good stewards of those resources to facilitate their effective utilization in service to others.

As we focus on ensuring Zion is positioned and equipped to fulfill its Statement of Purpose, the Councilmembers are reading (in some instances rereading) Thom S. Rainer's "Autopsy of a Deceased Church." One of the many cogent and salient points Rainer makes is that vibrant and living churches look after the interests of others while dying churches look inward. Just as we as human beings are at our worst when we look inward and concentrate on our grief and troubles rather than outward at the Blessings God has provided. A church that focuses on the comfort of its members to the exclusion of the interests and needs of others outside the church cannot survive.

In Matthew 28:19-20, Jesus gives us the Great Commission to make disciples, baptize and teach; and tells us that He will be with us to the end of the age. In the months ahead Zion's Elders will be asking the Congregation to take a good, hard look at our budgeting and resource allocation process to gauge the extent to which we on Council are being forthright and transparent and to evaluate whether our humble efforts are truly focused on accomplishing the Great Commission.

Lord, thank You for entrusting to our care the abundant resources needed to serve others. Thank You for instilling in us the wisdom and determination to be good stewards of those resources. Guide us in our performance of the Great Commission. In Jesus' Name we pray. Amen.

Acme Community Cash Back




The Community Cash Back program will run from August 1, 2023 – February 15, 2024.


This year, we will be celebrating the 10-year anniversary of "God's work, Our hands".

God's blessings to you all! It is so refreshing and uplifting to see evidence of God's abundant blessings every day: the sun shining brightly, pleasant temperatures, sufficient rain but only in the evenings, and nature's abundant colors radiating for all to enjoy. Truly the Holy Spirit is shining on us and I hope you take the time to embrace it, enjoy it and pass it forward!

This summer has been very exciting with numerous examples of Zion's ministries. VBS in the last week of June was an exhilarating schedule of events for children in our community as well as a rewarding experience for a multitude of Zion volunteers. During July and August, Zion's enthusiastic team of "yellow shirt" volunteers completed our 2nd and 3rd work sessions for the 2023 Habitat for Humanity Faith Build. The 2nd session focused on siding to finish the exterior for one of three deserving family's homes and 3rd to complete internal painting. Habitat personnel love to work with Zion's efficient and effective Team, while the positive reinforcement received from the Habitat deserving families is heart-warming.

Another major ministry event was the Cruise-In on July 21 to benefit Valor Home for homeless veterans. Excellent weather served as the backdrop for a very successful evening involving 90+ colorful vintage cars filling our yard around the pavilion, 300+ hungry patrons which were efficiently served by a cadre of 25+ Zion volunteers. This positive and rewarding environment supported our efforts to raise \$3,000 to contribute to Valor Home operations.

Your enthusiastic participation and financial support to these activities, in addition to our monthly Food Pantry and Shared Goods Place ministries, allow us to demonstrate that "Zion matters to the community by showing the love of Jesus Christ". The community is noticing this effort as evidenced by the numerous positive comments received at these events.

Our July and Year-to-Date ("YTD") giving results are a conundrum. On one hand, 60 percent of Zion members are giving at a rate which is more than 110 percent of their 2022 levels, and 75 percent of members giving rates are greater than 2022. This is excellent and in alignment with our 2023 approved budget of 10 percent increase; however, the current total giving YTD is 10 percent less than our budgeted amount producing noted deficit. Our issue is not with expenses, which YTD are actually within budget in aggregate, but with giving.

For your information, Zion has received offerings from 104 givers YTD; 22 who are new this year. Based on our median giving level, 50 percent of Zion givers are generating 93 percent of our total giving. This confirms that there is ample opportunity for all givers to improve these rates and ensure funds are available to support our ministries when they are needed. Small increases can aggregate and have a large positive impact. Your consistent positive financial support is critical to our mission to adequately fund Zion's ministries.

Opportunities abound to make 2023 a safe, happy, and healthy year sharing the resources God has made available to us to positively impact our community. God will assist to make your individual contributions multiply to ensure it happens.

Lord, it is amazing to see the positive impact that your resources can have on the community. Please provide the inspiration necessary for us to recognize needs in our community and to appropriately respond to them. We do this in honor of your glorious name, Amen.

School kits: Spiral notebooks (wide or college rule), 30-centimeter ruler (or inches & centimeter), pencil sharpeners, blunt scissors, unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers, black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink), box of 16 or 24 crayons and 2 ½ " eraser.

Personal hygiene kits: Light-weight bath towel (20X40 or 52X27), bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz. in original wrapping, sturdy comb (no picks or fine-toothed), and metal nail clippers.


Pastor's Ponderings, September, 2023

Lately, I've been pondering life. Well, actually, death. I heard somewhere that we begin our journey to death the moment we are born. Well, that takes a lot of the fun and excitement out of being around newborns. So, I stopped pondering that line of thought. Elsewhere, I heard that we begin to die when we stop growing. And that got me to pondering

again.
I think we begin to die when we stop growing in spirit, wisdom, and outward focus.
And that, my fellow siblings in Christ, got me to thinking about Christ's church.
In an upcoming gospel (or rather, by the time you read this, it will be a recently past gospel)
Jesus tells Peter that Christ will build his church upon Peter's confession that Jesus is the Son of the Living God (Matthew 16:16-18).

Christ built his church and it expanded around the globe. But when Christ's church stops growing, it begins to die. The only question that remains is: what will you choose? Life or death?






Zion is slowing gaining recognition as the church that cares about the community. With each event and activity more and more people are getting to see the love of Jesus being expressed for them. Way to go!


We are in need of sports bras for our girls if anyone can help. Soon we will be putting our needs on an Amazon wish list, and I will keep you informed.

cannot thank upu enaugh &r au you do! One blood donation can change the lives of so many people. Almost 2 ½ yrs. ago someone's selfless act of donating blood changed my life as well.

My younger brother, Mat, is an ER Doctor. He began feeling sick after working the night shift in the ER and thought he wasn't eating enough or drinking too much coffee while he was working. A few weeks later he began vomiting after his shifts.

Mat had bloodwork done and his enzymes were elevated so he scheduled an MRI. 10 days after his 40th birthday he was diagnosed with Stage 4 Pancreatic Cancer and given 6-12 months to live.

He has had surgeries to remove his gall bladder, spleen, part of his pancreas, 50 tumors out of his liver and scar tissue. Mat has needed blood transfusions after his surgeries. Blood Donors are part of the reason he is still here 31 months after his diagnosis!

With all my heart I would like to personally thank you for organizing blood drives, recruiting for them, and for all the heroes that take time out of their day to donate blood.

People like you have given my family the greatest gift you can

give someone. The gift of more time.
